The mission of the Santa Rosa Community Day School is to provide an alternative placement for middle and high school students who have been involuntarily transferred from the regular school setting, due to alcohol, drugs, or weapons infractions. These students require an alternate placement for up to one year. The school provides a well-structured educational facility for troubled students. The Community Day School is a place to develop appropriate decision-making skills for dealing with life's lessons as well as to achieve academic success. Our goal is for students to develop the necessary skills that will enable them to re-enter the general education system and to re-enter the regular school setting with their peers.

III. School Climate

School Safety Plan (School Year 2011-12)

This section provides information about the school's comprehensive safety plan, including the dates on which the safety plan was last reviewed, updated, and discussed with faculty; as well as a brief description of the key elements of the plan.

Safety of students and staff is a primary concern of Borrego Springs Unified School District, and as such, of Santa Rosa Community Day School. Santa Rosa welcomes visitors, but asks all visitors to sign in at the front office of the high school to obtain a visitor's badge, to be respectful of the learning process, and to minimize classroom disruptions. Before and after school and during lunch, staff and the principal monitor campus activity.

The Comprehensive Safe School Plan was developed by the District to comply with Senate Bill 187 (SB 187) of 1997. The plan provides students and staff a means of ensuring a safe and orderly learning environment. Each school in the District includes the following requirements of SB 187 within their safe school plans: current status of school crime; child abuse reporting procedures; disaster procedures, routine and emergency procedures; policies related to suspension and expulsion; notification to teachers; sexual harassment policy; provision of a school-wide dress code; safe ingress and egress of pupils, parents and school employees; safe and orderly school environment; and school rules and procedures.

Safety procedures, including elements of the Safe School Plan, are reviewed with school and District staff in the fall, at the start of each school year. The plan was last updated and reviewed with school staff in February, 2006. A Safe Schools Committee was formed in December 2012 to revisit and revise the School Safety Plan for all schools. The committee will meet on an ongoing basis to revamp the plan. A copy of the plan is available for public review at the school office.

Santa Rosa Community Day School participates with Borrego Springs Middle School and High School in all monthly safety-related exercises, including fire drills, earthquake drills, and lock-down drills. SRCDS collaborates with local law enforcement in drills and simulations of threatening situations that might endanger our students.

An updated campus map indicating student gathering points and critical utility shut-off valves is placed in all classrooms and also resides in the school and district office.

Santa Rosa Community Day School (SRCDS) is located to the north of Borrego Springs Middle School. SRCDS provides a safe, clean environment for students, staff, and volunteers. The SRCDS building is a converted portable classroom and was placed in its current location in 2003. SRCDS is able to use the facilities of BSMS and BSHS which includes a new gymnasium, multipurpose room, administrative offices, and is situated in an attractive, park-like setting. The locker room facilities and bathrooms were modernized for handicapped accessibility and outside landscape upgrades were completed in the 2004-05 school year. IX. Student Performance

The Standardized Testing and Reporting (STAR) Program consists of several key components, including:

- **California Standards Tests (CSTs)**, which include English-language arts (ELA) and mathematics in grades two through eleven; science in grades five, eight, and nine through eleven; and history-social science in grades eight, and nine through eleven.
- **California Modified Assessment (CMA)**, an alternate assessment that is based on modified achievement standards in ELA for grades three through eleven; mathematics for grades three through seven, Algebra I, and Geometry; and science in grades five and eight, and Life Science in grade ten. The CMA is designed to assess those students whose disabilities preclude them from achieving grade-level proficiency on an assessment of the California content standards with or without accommodations.
- **California Alternate Performance Assessment (CAPA)**, includes ELA and mathematics in grades two through eleven, and science for grades five, eight, and ten. The CAPA is given to those students with significant cognitive disabilities whose disabilities prevent them from taking either the CSTs with accommodations or modifications or the CMA with accommodations.

The assessments under the STAR Program show how well students are doing in relation to the state content standards. On each of these assessments, student scores are reported as performance levels.

Because Santa Rosa Community Day School is a temporary involuntary placement for high school students, only the core graduation requirements are taught: English, math, science, social sciences, Spanish. Students are dismissed at 12:10 pm each day, and as such, the high school ROP/CTE courses are not available to SRCDS students.

XII. Instructional Planning and Scheduling

Professional Development

Because of the small teaching staff, curriculum and staff development decisions for staff are made working directly with the principal and in conjunction with the Borrego Springs Middle and High School staff.

The teacher at SRCDS attends all Monday Collaborations, along with the teachers from Borrego Springs Middle and High Schools, and Palm Canyon Continuation High School. At the Monday Collaborations, teachers review student data to plan instruction, learn best practices from other teaches, and discuss and plan student interventions.
